The Caerleon Roman Fortress and Baths museum (Welsh: Caer a Baddonau Rhufeinig Caerllion Amgueddfa) is a historical site located in the town of Caerleon, South Wales. Near to the city of Newport, it is run by the Welsh historic environment service Cadw .

Caerleon is a site of considerable archaeological importance as the location of a Roman legionary fortress or castra. It was the headquarters for Legio II Augusta from about 75 to 300 AD, and on the hill above was the site of an Iron Age hillfort. The Romans called the site Isca after the River Usk (Welsh Wysg). The name Caerleon may derive from the Welsh for "fortress of the legion"; around 800 ...

Caerleon Roman Fortress is home to the impressive remains of a first century Roman legionary barracks, fortifications, amphitheatre and baths. In fact, they are said to be Europe's only such barracks on display. Built in approximately 75AD, the Caerleon Roman Fortress was known as Isca and would have been home to the Second Augustan Legion.

Modern day Caerleon is a small town of some seven thousand people, situated alongside the tidal River Usk, just escaping the urban sprawl of nearby Newport in south east Wales. Only since the early 1900's have the secrets of the Roman fortress of Isca been slowly rescued from oblivion. Prior to this, visitors to the ruins had mistakenly confused the remains of Britain's biggest Roman Amphitheatre with King Arthur's Round Table!

Caerleon, town, archaeological site, and residential suburb of Newport, Newport county borough, southern Wales. Caerleon lies on the River Usk. It was important as the Roman fortress of Isca, which was, along with Deva (Chester) and Eboracum (York), one of the permanent legionary bases in Britain.

Caerleon has the finest remains of Roman barrack buildings in Europe. This block housed a century - 80 men. The larger rooms in the foreground were for the centurion. Legionaries shared quarters - eight men to a room.

The Roman Remains In Caerleon Legionary Fortress ISCA

Caerleon Legion Fort, called Isca in Roman times, was built around 75 AD. Its construction was related with the campaigns of the Britain's governor, Julius Frontinus against the Celtic tribe of Silures, who occupied the lands of south-east Wales.

Caerleon has historic origins as an Iron Age Silures hill fort. Upon the arrival of the Roman outposts across Britain, including at nearby Caerwent, the Isca Augusta fortress at Caerleon developed on the River Usk as an important route for goods and men into the country.

Caerleon was the site of one of Britain's three permanent Roman Legionary Fortresses, and many believe it to be the location of King Arthur's Camelot. In 830 AD Nennius listed Cair Lion as one of Britain's 33 cities. Nowadays it's a thriving town, where past and present combine to delight both visitors and residents.

The Caerleon Roman Fortress and Baths museum is a historical site located in the town of Caerleon, South Wales, close to the National Roman Legion Museum. The Roman Wales fortress at Caerleon was built in AD 75 was one of only three permanent Roman Legionary fortresses in Roman Britain. It was occupied and operational for just over 200 years.

In 74 AD the II Augusta Legion founded a fort at Isca, in what is now Caerleon. The fort was built in the territory of the most powerful tribe in

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southern Wales, the Silures. Establishing the fort here was a statement of power by the Romans, who were still wary of the local tribes after the threat of Boudicca's rebellion in 60 AD.

Caerleon Roman Fortress, Baths, and Amphitheatre, History ...

Caerleon was one of only three permanent fortresses in Roman Britain. known as Isca to the Romans, the fortress itself was a playing-card shape, covering 50 acres of land in which the Museum now lies. Just a few minutes walk from the galleries takes you to the most complete Amphitheatre in Britain, beautifully presented Fortress Baths, and the only remains of a Roman Legionary Barracks on view anywhere in Europe.

The extensive remains of the legionary fortress at Caerleon lay just claim to being one of the largest and most important Roman military sites in Europe. Established around AD 75 as the headquarters of the second Augustan Legion — Legio II Augusta — the legionary fortress of Isca took its name from the nearby river Usk.

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
