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Lord Elgin And The Marbles

The Parthenon Marbles (Greek: Γλυπτά του Παρθενώνα), also known as the Elgin Marbles (/ 'ɛlɡɪn /), are a collection of Classical Greek marble sculptures made under the supervision of the architect and sculptor Phidias and his assistants. They were originally part of the temple of the Parthenon and other buildings on the Acropolis of Athens.

Lord Elgin and the Parthenon Marbles

Of the items that Lord Elgin, took from atop the Acropolis, it is estimated that he looted some 247 feet of frieze from the Parthenon, what is commonly referred to today as the so-called "Elgin Marbles". Furthermore, it is believed that Elgin took around half of what was still standing of the Parthenon at that time.
