Please sit quietly. We try to use quiet voices in the classroom so that we do not disturb the rights of others who are working. Please keep interaction with the teacher to a minimum unless approached. Observe the entire classroom. Look for qualities of independence, self-discipline, social interaction, attention, concentration and joy.
