Parenteral nutrition can be classified as total parenteral nutrition (TPN) or partial parenteral nutrition (PPN). TPN provides 100% of an animal's resting energy requirements and must be administered through a dedicated central catheter, such as a jugular catheter, because of its hypertonicity (generally >1000 mOsm/L).
